

#### Director's Chat

This year the library Board of Trustees increased the materials budget. We are ordering more books and DVDs for you. If you did not notice, it may be because many popular items have holds on them. You can see lists of the new items on the slide show above the circulation desk. We encourage you to put holds on items that interest you. A staff member is happy to help.

We made many building improvements to make your library visit more enjoyable. Last summer we had the building façade painted. After that we started working on the interior. This summer we will have air conditioning so you can finally come to the library in the hot months and cool down reading a book, magazine, checking your e-mail on our computers, or using the Wi-Fi on your own device. Here is a list of improvement that have been made:

HVAC was installed by Anderson's Heating A/C & Plumbing in the main library and the Community Room.

The Community Room was cleaned, painted, floor leveled, and safe outlets, new carpet and base boards installed.

The newly painted Community Room now features all four of Patricia B. Hasting's beautiful Lewis & Clark quilts. Check out her series of books, Quilting the Journeys of Lewis & Clark, located in our Montana room.

Gently-used furniture that matches the new meeting room carpet is coming from Farmer's State Bank in Stevensville. To those of you that bank there, I'm sure they would appreciate you mentioning it.

In the Children's Room a corner wall was removed, the walls were painted with sky and clouds and repurposed shelves were moved into the room.

Hallways and bathrooms were painted, dirty vents cleaned, unsteady plumbing repaired. Bistro tables and chairs are now in the front window area near the magazines. We put in outlets for those of you that want to use it as an internet café but you have to bring your own latte! (Covered beverages are allowed except by public computers.)

A great big THANK YOU to Colleen Miller for all her quality construction work in the Children's Room and other areas of the library.

The board and I are being responsible and frugal with the library finances. Many of these items were free or low cost and your taxes were not increased.

However, the library could use some additional improvements. We would like to put supports under the floor of the main library, level the floor and get new carpeting. Asbestos abatement is required for some work. Donations to the Library Foundation would help make those projects a reality.

The board wants to start long range planning and needs community input. We would like to have a community survey and focus group. If you are interested in participating in a focus group, please let me know. We also have a box on the circulation desk for your suggestions and ideas.

# Youth Services Updates

Greetings from the Youth Services section of the library! This winter has been incredibly busy for the Children's and Youth sections. We've increased our collection in several areas, completely remodeled the Children's Room and hosted some wonderful programs.

Remodel: The Children's

Room has been extensively remodeled, beginning in the fall of 2014 and finishing this February. The old furnace was removed, making room for more bookcases and play space. The walls were repainted with blue sky and clouds, courtesy of Colleen Miller. The new colored lights were provided by the Friends of the Library. We also now have a display bookcase, which features some of our newest titles in Juvenile Non-Fiction, Biography and Fiction. The changes and additions are too numerous to recap here, so stop by and browse through!

Collection Additions: We've been focusing on adding to our non-fiction for kids of all ages. Our latest additions include several titles on the American Civil War, World War II and Zoology. We've also expanded our foreign language selections...come in and learn about

German, French, Spanish, Japanese, Mandarin (Chinese), Russian and more! DVD's have also expanded, including educational titles for preschool and kindergarten, the latest cartoon and feature film releases and anime and TV series. Audiobooks have also increased both classics and new fiction titles. Juvenile Biography now includes books on Mother Teresa, Malala Yousafzai, Shaun White, Adele, Anne Frank, Abraham Lincoln and Jim Thorpe.

**Teen:** Our young adult (YA) area has also undergone new additions. We replaced most of our bookcases with larger ones, and added a YA display bookcase for our newest titles, including Fiction, Manga, Non-Fiction and Biography. There are couches and moveable desks for studying, reading and working. In the last year, we created a YA DVD section which now includes movies. anime, and TV series. Audiobooks have also been increased, especially for popular teen series.

**Programs:** This winter we hosted some special events, in addition to our regular Story Time and Lego Time programs. With a grant from the Gilder Lehrman Institute, we were able to host two programs on the American Civil War. First, Abraham Lincoln visited our library! Second, we hosted the "History Detective" program (presented by Kristjana Eyjólfsson from the Historical Museum at Fort Missoula) for 20 teens and children. We hope to host similar events in the future.

Our most recent special event was "Bingo for Books," in honor of National Library Week. Over 30 children and their parents played Bingo and won books. Bingo was followed by pizza and door prizes. Thanks to Shannon Miller and Nancy Morrison for the donated prizes!

Summer Reading: It's hard to believe, but it's almost summer time! That means it's also time to start thinking about our summer reading programs.

This year's theme is "Every Hero Has a Story." We will be

having several special guests for our weekly Story Time program, and some special presentations too. We will also have a Superhero Science Club, a book club for ages 9-
