More Books for Kids

The North Valley Public Library is the proud recipient of a Pilcrow Rural Public Library grant!

The **Pilcrow Foundation** recognizes the importance of libraries in rural communities and supports their mission of providing quality hardcover books to rural libraries through Children's Book Project grants.

The grant requires that the Library raise base monies through a local sponsor. **Rocky Mountain Bank** stepped up and donated the maximum base money - \$400 – so the **North Valley Public Library Foundation** could apply for the

grant. This base money is tripled in value if the grant is awarded. So, the Library was able to procure \$1200 worth of new children's books from the Pilcrow catalog.

The books have arrived. Of the 75 books, 72% are for EARLY and BEGINNING READERS (birth to 7 years), while 28% are MIDDLE and INTERMEDIATE to ADVANCED READERS (ages 7-12 years).

Annika Riley, our Youth Services Director, is in the process of cataloguing the books. Once catalogued, they will be placed temporarily on separate shelving so patrons can readily review the new inventory.




BOOK NEWS



Early Literacy Tip

Make associations between ideas, words, and pictures.

While this strategy digresses from the storyline a little bit, pausing to make associations will help your child with word retrieval. Older toddlers may be more linguistic, but seemingly lack the words to get their ideas out fluidly. When we stop and identify things on the page and associate them with other things the child knows, we make retrieval easier. For example, you can identify that a cow and zebra are both black and white. Or, you can ask if a butterfly and an ant are both bugs. By categorizing, linking, and elaborating on concepts, we will slowly make it easier for our child to identify what they want to say. Source: parentingfromtheheartblog.com


Kid's Book Review




Space Telescope & Rockets Thursday, August 1 at 5:30 pm

Dean Spieth presents an overview of intercontinental ballistic missiles (ICBMs), large launch vehicles (Saturn-Apollo moon rockets, Falcon), and space telescopes. Space telescopes, like DSP and

SBIRS, provide early warning of rocket launches all over the earth. Other space telescopes are used to monitor the earth's environment (weather satellites, ozone, fire, etc.) or view into deep space like the Hubble Space Telescope (HST).

Dean worked with rockets, satellites, and space telescopes for forty years, first at the Rocket Propulsion Lab on Edwards AFB (today part of AFRL), then in the Denver area primarily at Martin Marietta (today part of Lockheed-Martin) and Ball Aerospace. All content is unclassified approved for public release. This presentation is suitable for teenagers and adults.


Television Trivia Saturday, August 17 at 3 pm
