# **Time for Change**

North Valley Public Library (NVPL) is adjusting hours starting November 1, 2024. The library will be open Monday-Friday 10am-6pm, and the 1st, 3rd, and 5th Saturdays of the month.

The board voted to change the North Valley Public Library hours at the October 16 meeting. This change is in response to staff shortages and evaluation of library usage statistics from July 1, 2023-October 11, 2024.

The reduction of hours is when the library is minimally used, so the board considers this to be the most fiscal responsible action. Based on the library's budget, it was not feasible to hire another staff member.

Director Denise Ard said, "Saturdays have historically been slow days, but the library still wants to offer some Saturday hours to patrons. Therefore, instead of eliminating all Saturdays, the library will be closed on the 2nd and 4th Saturdays and open on the 1st, 3rd, and 5th. I realize this is a

bit harder to follow but am hopeful that this will serve the community better. With the advent of smart phones most people have access to a calendar so can see which Saturdays we are open."

Ard said, "Most of the staff are part time and we have only 5 FTE (Full-time equivalent employees). It became obvious that we did not have enough staff to cover 52 hours of open hours, offer programming, run the library, and cover the absences that happen in life.

This change in hours allows overlap in coverage. An added benefit of greater coverage is that we can add a children's art program on Saturdays. If you have input on a convenient time to attend a children's art program on Saturday, please let the library know."

# (May 30-Aug 11)


Through this program, parents read interactively with young children, ages 0-4. These activities and challenges are designed to help instill lifelong literacy skills.

# Summer Reading Program Report, June-August 2024

#### **Animal Wonders**

**Animal Wonders provides** homes to displaced exotic animals and nonreleasable wildlife. This educational outreach programs brought families to the library to learn about Simon the parakeet (who does tricks!), Otis the lesser (smaller) anteater, Ernie, Felicia & Shredded Cheese the salamanders, Wonder the porcupine and Indie the bearded dragon.







50 children & family members expanded their animal knowledge. 8 adults attended the Animal Wonders Adult session.

# **Baby & Me Storytime**

An early literacy program for parents, grandparents

with babies 0-2 years. This program proved a great place to share nursery rhymes, music and stories using a felt board, percussion instruments &

dancing scarves.

Attendance ranged from 13-

25 weekly including children with their parents & occasional grandparent. Moms commented how their babies enjoy the music shakers & rhythm sticks and how their kiddos often repeat the activities at home.

159 child & parent attendance counted over 9 storytimes where participants learned early literacy skills.

# Stories & Songs for **Preschoolers**

In this dynamic early literacy program, 0-5 year old attendees learned letters, sounds, numbers,



emotions, rhymes, taking turns, days of the week and so much more.

Attendance ranged from 22-41 weekly including children with their parents, grandparents, or nannies. Many families came week after week building friendships and community.

276 child & parent attendance counted over the 9 storytimes where participants learned early literacy

### Science Squad

This weekly hour and a half long program for 8-12 year olds facilitated exploration of our natural world. This summer we delved into paper chromatography,

learned about the mysteries of honey bees, completed supertaster & smelling labs & even built atoms. Class size ranged from 4-11 participants. Attendees made



Science Notebooks complete with research notes,

illustrations, photographs,

and activity sheets.



70 youth attendance counted over the 9 sessions where participants learned science, technology, engineering, art, and math skills.

# Learn With a Fire Fighter (& Smokey the Bear himself)

In cooperation with Fire in the Root, Montana DNRC, and the US Forest Service, NVPL sponsored this



important learning opportunity for our youth living in and around a fire-prone forest. Bitterroot Firefighters read the story of Smokey the Bear, taught the kids campfire safety, how to aim a real firehose from a forest service engine and how to work wildfire hand tools.

**46** children & their family members participated in this interactive learning program about wildland and fire safety.
